Mississippi Pay It Forward Program

Mississippi, our nation, and the world need a new generation of leaders to solve our most pressing problems.

The Mississippi Pay It Forward program partners with the national nonprofit organization Students Today Leaders Forever (STLF) to reveal leadership through service, relationships, and action.


STLF hosts Pay It Forward Tours, trips for 30-40 students each that combine community service, leadership development, teambuilding, college visits, tourism, and reflection—all while traveling to four cities in five days, led by college student mentors.

The trip is designed to connect students with service opportunities, strengthen student leadership capacity, and build a cohesive team of supporters so that students return to their home communities ready to creating lasting change in their own hometowns!

Students in Mississippi who have participated in the Pay It Forward Tour join a national movement of servant-leaders. To date, over 27,500 students have participated in over 700 total STLF Pay It Forward Tours.

Across the country, students typically pay hundreds of dollars to participate on the Pay It Forward Tour. This sort of fee makes the Tour inaccessible to many students of Mississippi, so the Mississippi Pay It Forward program spearheads an aggressive fundraising campaign to ensure students do not have to pay a single cent in registration fees. Students are only asked to pay for one meal per day.

Having just completed the eleventh Mississippi Pay It Forward Tour in seven years, the program has become an enduring institution that students look forward to annually.

Service

With the Navarre Beach Sea Turtle Conservation Center, students removed nearly 20 pounds of trash from Florida beaches in order to help preserve the local marine life.

With the Alfred B. Maclay Garden State Park, students helped to clear pathways to allow visitors to better connect with nature and history, and removed invasive crop species from the park.

With the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, students helped to organize clothing and food that would be donated to area homeless men and women.

With the Arts Council in Oxford, students planted trees, repainted items, and cleaned up the area.

With the Second Harvest Food Bank, students boxed food items.

With Hickory Valley Retirement, students performed songs for center residents.

With the Atlanta 3x3 Project, students collaborated to establish school gardens that would provide nutritious alternatives to traditional school lunches, and teach elementary students about horticulture.















Leadership

In the evening, at rest stops, even while on the bus, a team of trained facilitators led students in a series of carefully sequenced activities – everything from lighthearted icebreakers to in-depth discussions on equity and justice. Some activities were done as a full group, and others were done in small cohorts led by a college student mentor.





College

This year, students had the opportunity to visit the University of Mississippi, Florida A&M University, Florida State University, Spelman College, and Morehouse College. Students also heard from a panel of college students who provided advice on navigating the college experience.











Tourism

Students were able to visit a beach and explore a turtle conservatory. They were able to shop and explore downtown Atlanta, and the Square in Oxford. They played football and basketball.







Impact in their own words

"This week has been the best week to me. I decided to do community service for the summer to help others. It felt really good to work with people you hardly hang around just to help others. I was very happy to see everybody work together to get the job done for the day. I really learned a lot this week during the Pay It Forward Tour. I look forward to doing this again next year."
